

Guess who showed up at a Woodfield breakfast!

Have you ever had one of these little guys show up uninvited?

In a recent report in Woodfield, a rat was seen stealing a pancake right out of the frying pan as the family sat down to breakfast. In another incident, a few brazen party crashers showed up during a barbeque.

Rats are an unavoidable part of our environment. The goal is to make our living spaces less attractive to them.

If you are a tenant, inform your landlord and try to resolve the issue together. Landlords have obligations but if unreported, they cannot help. If the situation is not addressed, report the situation to the Municipal Law Enforcement Officer.

If you are the property owner, call a local pest control company.

If the rat activity is generated from an adjacent property, attempt to resolve the issue with the property owner. If unsuccessful, the phone numbers below may help to motivate the owner to act.

To discourage rat activity:

- Keep the lids closed on large communal garbage bins.
 Keep garbage secure and put it out as late as possible — early morning is best. Metal containers with secure lids are best — avoid garbage in plastic bags.
- Rats look for nesting spots and food. Composting provides a food source. Stop composting until the infestation is over or totally secure the compost. Rats will tunnel under a composter from a few feet away. Sink your composter into the ground and add a light gauge wire fabric underneath the composter, extend it a few feet in every direction to discourage tunneling. This still allows the soil to breath and worms to do their magic.
- Don't use an open compost pile

- Don't put egg shells, meat or dairy into your compost
- Agitate the contents regularly (rats only like undisturbed heaps)

Trapping Rats

- Spring loaded traps generally lead to a quick end. Glue traps and poisons are slow working and may result in having to deal with the termination of a live animal.
- If rats are getting into your compost, place spring loaded traps right into your composter (assuming other animals aren't getting in).

The Trees for Woodfield committee met in early October with London's Manager of Urban Forestry Ivan Lister - and the Supervisor of

Roadside Operations, Rick Cosby. Rick is deeply involved in tree planting in the forestry department.

We had a very useful conversation with these gentlemen and now we need your input and co-operation as residents, as well.

Here is how you can help

Residents along William Street and Cartwright Street have been advised that their street will be dug up next summer. Public information meetings will be held before the work begins. PLEASE take time to attend these meetings. They give you an opportunity to see the scope of the work to be done and will allow you the opportunity to ask questions.

What does this road construction have to do with boulevard trees?

At the Public Information Meeting, you will be advised about what trees will need to be felled and what trees may be damaged.

Can they be saved in any way? Are there alternative methods that could have less impact on the trees root system?

When digging takes place, the tree roots are often severely challenged, damaging the trees irrevocably.

TREE PROTECTION policies and procedures (orange fencing around tree areas) will be put in place. But please be responsible and safeguard the trees on your front yard and boulevard. Be aware and alert - by Hilary Moon, Trees for Woodfield

throughout the construction process. Do not take anything for granted. Not all on-site construction workers have their minds on the importance of trees in our neighborhood or how best to work around them.

The mandate that Trees for Woodfield has taken as their guideline is to get as many trees back on our boulevards as possible, restoring the treescape of this Historic District to the way it was 50 years ago. Large trees lined all the streets and provided many benefits to our urban environment including cooling shade in the heat of the summer.

Trees are a **must have** in order to keep our residential area a healthy and lovely place to live.

When the City asks to plant a tree on the boulevard in front of your home, please tell them a resounding YES!
