### Heritage Alteration Permits must now be visible on site

ERITAGE ALTERATION PERMIT

If you are receiving this newsletter, chances are you are in one of Woodfield's two Heritage Conservation Districts!

If you are planning any (even minor) exterior renovations remember – all work on the exterior of buildings in the Woodfield Heritage Districts requires that a quick and **free** Heritage Alteration Permit be acquired and hung visibly on site.

Contact Kyle Gonyou (City Heritage Planner) at 519-661-2500 (ext 5344) to get your permit if you are planning any work (to avoid delays or a 'stop work' order).

Also if you see alterations without a permit visible, please give Kyle a call so that he can set the owner up with one.

## PLANNING NOTES: Eyes on potential developments

The following is a brief update on some of the potential developments in our area. We'll continue to watch as these progress and engage the broader community where appropriate.

#### 560 & 562 Wellington

The Auburn Development application for a 22-storey (78m tall) mixed-use apartment building was downsized to less than 20 storeys earlier this year. The application currently is on hold, pending the Victoria Park Precinct Study by the City of London.

#### **Victoria Park Precinct Study**

Last spring, London City Council approved the Victoria Park Precinct Study to look at how the lands surrounding Victoria Park could be developed in the future. About 100 people attended at public input meeting earlier this fall and learned that there are several potential locations for new developments in the immediate park area including three large lots currently zoned to allow for buildings as high as 90 metres. Many felt that some development would be acceptable but not 30 storeys, while others felt there should be no new development in the immediate area. Most agreed that too many high rises would negatively impact the park. Reasons included concerns about shadowing, wind,

access to the park, and traffic, all detrimental to the health and public use of the park.

The City will host another public meeting later this year. The Woodfield Community Association will send out a notification as soon as a date has been announced. In the meantime, if you wish to share your thoughts on the future of Victoria Park, please contact the City Planner, Michelle Knieriem at mknieriem@london.ca.

#### 467 & 469 Dufferin

This duplex was to be the subject of an Ontario Municipal Board hearing earlier this fall at which Marigold Development was appealing the City's decision to deny its application to construct a 12-unit building. However, the hearing has been pushed to next year. This means this building will degrade further. Just a few years ago it was in much better condition and fully rented. Why is this building significant? There is solid evidence that the building

could be from the British Military barracks making it one of the most important sites in the City. Other research confirmed the building to be the site of the first Labour Council Office, the first London Library, the first newspaper and a founding home of a national political party. As a community association, we continue to pressure the owner to keep up the building and do basic maintenance.

#### **Adelaide Street Underpass**

The environmental study for an underpass is complete and submitted to the province. The assessment can be appealed and we are waiting to see if that happens. Then the project moves to the next phase which will entail more detailed design work. Currently the project will include a two-lane detour through McMahen Park during construction, a realignment of Central Avenue, and park area to the west. The detailed design work can take a while. Stand by for updates!

# Trees are Trendy! Catch the big city trend!

Many cities put a lot of resources into their Urban Forest, and Urban Design is currently focused on green spaces. In Woodfield our largest public green space is Victoria Park. Certainly, our City Planners will protect and maintain that Park. Probably there will never be concrete covering all of the park and there will always be grass and trees. But there is another dimension to concrete and that is the vertical dimension: high walls of concrete and glass for proposed highrises. Infill planning is important, but our parks and green spaces are equally vital. Both City Planners and developers have a vested interest in increasing the density around Victoria Park, and ultimately it is all reduced to the mighty dollar.

Why would these high walls of concrete and glass negatively effect our precious Victoria Park?

1. Some of the open sky and hours of sunshine, essential to the wellbeing

and flourishing of trees, will be lost.

2. Many birds will die or suffer by flying into the windows of highrises. Fewer birds effect the ecosystem, including trees.

The intended buildings are too close and too high for our Park. These may seem small considerations but attention must be given to protect a vibrant urban forest.

In Canada we plant millions of trees each year — but we cut down millions more than planted. It takes approximately 30 years for a new tree to replace the benefits of a mature tree. We need to focus on caring for our older, more valuable trees, while adding new ones for future generations.

Recently I read of an initiative spearheaded by Imran Khan, cricket-star turned politician, and now Prime Minister of Pakistan, that succeeded in planting 10 billion trees. Having the vision to plant 10 billion trees is enormous and it is heart-warming to hear of a politician that put his influence to such a positive undertaking — to *stop talking*, and *start planting*. I spent some of my childhood in Pakistan and I felt proud that this country was pursuing a programme that effects the globe.

In our City, Re-Forest London is committed to planting 1 million trees.

Please go to the website www.plantfor-the-planet.org as it is inspiring! Children creating a better world for themselves.

Trees for Woodfield monitors boulevard trees, and recently undertook a tree walk to identify where trees can be planted. 41 spaces were submitted to the Urban Forestry department. If you know of a boulevard space where a tree could be planted, please let us know, giving the street name and building number closest to the empty space.
