have several 'paint-outs' in Woodfield this year. It's London's oldest art club and it started at the former London Art Gallery when it was located at the old library on Queens Ave, so members feel that the club is coming back home. The 26th London Artists' **Studio Tour** is on April 26 (7-9 pm), 27 (10-5), and 28 (noon to 5) and includes 28 artists at 25 studios around the city. Four of the participating artists are located just adjacent to Woodfield at the Factory Building on Adelaide St. N. between Princess and Lorne; they welcome Woodfielders to come by. Moira Burke, Ingrid Connidis and Catherine Eichstedt are in Studio III, Unit 210 at 538 Adelaide St N (by Princess). Victoria Park Draft Secondary Plan to be presented in early Spring

The West Woodfield Heritage Conservation District determined that the desired scale for development around Victoria Park was a maximum of five storeys. Due to intensification goals for the downtown area, the London Plan supports development of properties surrounding the entire south half of the park to reach 30-35 storeys. This includes a proposal for twin high-rise towers on the surface parking lot behind St. Peter's Cathedral.

The Victoria Park Secondary Plan will create a framework for subsequent zoning decisions, nullifying the height restrictions imposed by the Heritage Conservation District and prevent contesting any future development proposals based on height.

The draft Secondary Plan will be presented to the Planning and Environment Committee during a Public Participation Meeting in early Spring, then to full Council in late Spring. Learn more at getinvolved. london.ca/VictoriaPark and follow a discussion of issues on the 'Friends of Victoria Park, London' Facebook group.

With grants from the City of London, Nature London, TD Friends of the Environment, United Church and member contributions, construction of the First-St. Andrew's Eco-Meditation Garden will be completed Spring 2019. Fanshawe's Environmental Design and Planning students helped plan this ecologically healthy land-scape which includes:

- Native trees
- A rain/pollinator fusion garden bed
- Acknowledging and celebrating the traditional First Nations lands, indigenous sacred plants

- A walking labyrinth for meditation and spiritual development
- A Chimney Swifts sign and observation bench
- A stage, which extends the front steps for functions such as worship, weddings and musical performances
- An organ pipe sculpture "In diversity there is harmony".

Woodfield and Victoria Park

In our quest to keep Woodfield well treed, *Trees for Woodfield Committee* recently met with two City Staff. We met with Kat Hodgins, Supervisor for Forestry Operations, and walked through Woodfield's Heritage District. We learned what urban foresters consider before planting a boulevard tree.

Recently, Woodfield resident Julie Michaud, who works with London's Parks, Planning and Design, attended our Tree Meeting and brought plans and sketches from the City archives, recording the history and development of Victoria Park. She shared with us the complicated considerations concerning trees, and keeping Victoria Park well treed.

Victoria Park is Woodfield's only open space. City Hall, identifies two essential purposes of the Park – to be a Strolling Park and also an Events Park. Sometimes these two assigned purposes are in conflict.

The summertime festivals demand space for booths, and trees sometimes interfere with that need. Tree roots are often trampled and the soil compacted, rendering it a non-supportive environment for existing roots and new growth.

What to do? How to achieve balance? The festivals are loved by thousands of people and Victoria Park is already invested with utilities and other necessary physical needs for these events. However, the festivals

place incredible pressure on the trees, and detract from other benefits of open space essential for the surrounding communities.

There is a very strong voice in London for these summer events. Events organizers and Tourism London work very hard to make these festivals the success they have become.

The voice for the Strolling Park between these events, and rest of the year, is not so strong, and it behooves us in Woodfield to provide, and lead that strong voice for the planting and protection of the trees. In Summertime, the paths are only enjoyed if they are shaded by large trees; people will throw a rug down and lay in the park if the grass is soft and green with large trees providing a cooling effect.

There are many benefits of large trees and many cities deem it negligent to not include trees as an essential of the Green Infrastructure in all planning, including parks.

In some cities in Europe and the US, the planting and maintenance of trees are of equal importance to both the City authorities and to the residents. Let's continue to make trees, especially in and around Woodfield, our continued priority for the benefit of every Londoner. Let's bring our influence and focus, to Victoria Park, the only open space that Woodfield has, that we gladly share with the whole city and with summer festivals!

A new tradition in Woodfield

Our second annual Woodfield Christmas Tree Lot was a great success in 2018, raising over \$400. We sold almost twice as many beautiful, fresh trees for Woodfield homes this year as we did last year, and the weather was perfect. Each year, Jeff and Wes drive an hour out in the country to pick up our trees, specially cut and ready to last the whole season (no trees that have been on the lot for weeks here).
