Planning Notes

560 & 562 Wellington Street Appeal Update:

This file has been ongoing since 2016. Auburn Developments' application to build a 17-storey (plus mechanical), on a site where only six were permitted was approved by City Council in 2021. Woodfield Community Association (WCA) board, with the support of a member vote at an earlier AGM, submitted an appeal to this decision to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT). ThinQ Technologies also did submitted an appeal.

However, on December 22, 2022, the board members of the association held a vote to withdraw from the appeal. The vote passed. Considerations centred on the financial burden: with a seven-day trial set by the OLT the cost of representation was estimated at \$50,000+.

In addition to the financial issues, developments within the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT) translated into more bad news. In talking with professionals in the field, changes at the OLT have been occurring over the past five years designed to deter appeals, particularly appeals from individuals and community groups

like ours. It is no longer sufficient to simply represent ourselves, as the WCA has done in the past.

The odds against a successful appeal are staggering: out of 178 decisions issued by the OLT as of September 2022, only six decisions went against developers. In other words, there is critical value in defending the existing City policies and designated heritage, the financial cost coupled with very low success rate made the appeal prohibitive and irresponsible to pursue.

The materials we paid for while we were an appellant were repurposed into participant statements in preparation for the March 2023 hearing, which was to be led by the other appellant on the file, ThinQ Technologies. However, on the Friday before the hearing was to start, ThinQ Technologies settled with Auburn. The height will not change but the design will be more in keeping with the heritage features in the neighbourhood. The trial therefore did not occur.

We do not have any more details at this time.

Trees for Woodfield: Mini Urban Forests

Today, as I write this, it's International Day of Forests. During the past couple of months, your 'Trees for Woodfield Committee' has been learning about mini urban forests, which are gaining momentum and popularity throughout many countries.

Mini urban forests are a way of managing small urban spaces to bring the benefits of natural forests into our cities and towns. A natural, nature-created forest takes about 200 years to reach full maturity, but a mini urban forest takes about 20 years to mature! The benefits are extensive: they can help to buffer climate change, provide habitat for urban creatures, and beauty to our urban settings.

One of the pioneers of this idea was a Japanese botanist, Akira Miyawaki. Miyawaki introduced his method for planting indigenous micro forests in the 1970s for more temperate or tropical climates. After the three years of establishing a mini forest, there is no more need for 'gardening', nature will take care of it.

If you can create a mini urban forest in your yard, it's important to remember that leaf litter and fallen branches are important parts of the habitat.

For more tips and information about starting a mini urban forest in your yard, the Trees for Woodfield committee will be at the Woodfield Plant Exchange on May 27. In addition to have a selection of trees for sale, we will have more information about mini urban forests. Come see us!
